

LEVY FOR THE PROVISION OF POLICE PROTECTION SERVICES

The City Council of the City of Electric City adopted Resolution No. 2014-13 concerning voter approval of its regular property tax levy. To provide for police protection services by establishing a police department or contracting for the provision of police protection services, this proposition would (1) increase the regular property tax levy by \$0.904288, from \$2.195712 to a rate of \$3.10 per \$1,000 assessed value for collection beginning in 2015 and (2) sets the levy rate of \$3.10 per \$1,000 assessed value as the base for computing levies in succeeding years.
