Ballot Instructions:

Use a blue or black ink pen to completely fill in the box to the left of your choice. To vote for a write-in candidate, completely fill in the box to the left of the words "Write-in" and write the name of the candidate on the line.


Vote for one choice for each office or ballot measure. If you vote for more than one choice for an office or ballot measure, no votes will be counted for that office or ballot measure.

To correct a mistake: Draw a line through the entire candidate's name as shown below. You then have the option of making another choice. Do not sign the ballot. If you sign or otherwise identify yourself on the ballot, the ballot will not be counted.

READ: Each candidate for President and Vice-President is the official nominee of a political party. For other partisan offices, each candidate may state a political party that he or she prefers. A candidate's preference does not imply that the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party, or that the party approves of or associates with that candidate.

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 985

Initiative Measure No. 985 concerns transportation.

This measure would open high-occupancy vehicle lanes to all traffic during specified hours, require traffic light synchronization, increase roadside assistance funding, and dedicate certain taxes, fines, tolls and other revenues to traffic-flow purposes.
