
Making selections

Passed by the Legislature and Ordered Referred by Petition

Referendum Measure No. 74

The legislature passed Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 6239 concerning marriage for same-sex couples, modified domestic-partnership law, and religious freedom, and voters have filed a sufficient referendum petition on this bill. This bill would allow same-sex couples to marry, preserve domestic partnerships only for seniors, and preserve the right of clergy or religious organizations to refuse to perform, recognize, or accommodate any marriage ceremony. Initiative Measure No. 502

Initiative Measure No. 502 concerns marijuana. This measure would license and regulate marijuana production, distribution, and possession for persons over twenty-one; remove state-law criminal and civil penalties for activities that it authorizes; tax marijuana sales; and earmark marijuana-related revenues. Proposed to the People by the Legislature Amendment to the State Constitution

Engrossed Senate Joint Resolution No. 8221

The Legislature has proposed a constitutional amendment on implementing the Commission on State Debt recommendations regarding Washington's debt limit. This amendment would, starting July 1, 2014, phase-down the debt limit percentage in three steps from nine to eight percent and modify the calculation date, calculation period, and the term general state revenues. Should this constitutional amendment be:

Senate Joint Resolution No. 8223

The Legislature has proposed a constitutional amendment on investments by the University of Washington and Washington State University. This amendment would create an exception to constitutional restrictions on investing public funds by allowing these universities to invest specified public funds as authorized by the legislature, including in private companies or stock. Advisory Vote No. 1

Engrossed Senate Bill 6635
The legislature eliminated, without a vote of the people, a business and occupation tax deduction for certain financial institutions' interest on residential loans, costing \$170,000,000, in its first ten years, for government spending. This tax increase should be:

Advisory Vote No. 2

Substitute House Bill 2590



Ambulance and Emergency Medical Services Funding \$567,296

"Shall an excess levy of eighty nine cents per thousand dollars of value, estimated to collect not more than five hundred sixty seven thousand two hundred ninety six dollars, be assessed against all property in Pacific County, except that within the boundaries of the Ocean Beach, Ocosta or North River School Districts, and collected in 2013 to subsidize ambulance and emergency medical services within the NPCEMS District No. 1 Service Area?"

Fire Protection District No. 15 Proposition No. 1

Shall Grays Harbor - Pacific County Fire Protection District No. 15 be authorized to levy upon the regular taxable property within the district, in addition to the regular levy, the sum of \$0.48 per \$1,000 assessed valuation, for collection in 2013 for the provision of Emergency Medical Services all as provided in Grays Harbor - Pacific County Fire Protection District No. 15 Resolution No. 2012-07 and the Laws of the State of Washington?

Fire Protection District No. 15 Proposition No. 2

The Board of Fire Commissioners of Grays Harbor-Pacific County Fire Protection District No. 15, adopted Resolution No. 2012-08 concerning a proposition to restore the District's regular property tax levy. The proposition authorizes the District to restore its regular property tax levy to an amount not to exceed \$1.00 per \$1,000 of assessed value to pay for fire protection and emergency medical services, to be levied in 2012 for collection in 2013 and would authorize setting a 101% limit factor for each of the five succeeding years and provide the maximum allowable levy in 2018. The maximum allowable levy in 2018 shall be used to determine future increases as allowed by Chapter 84.55 RCW. Should this proposition be:

The ballots will be mailed out on October 17, 2012. Registered voters may mail or deposit their ballot at the following locations: Auditor's office in South Bend or Long Beach, up to and including the day of the Election. Also for your convenience we have drive up drop boxes located at Naselle across from the State Patrol office by Naselle High School, Long Beach County Building parking lot and the South Bend Court house parking lot. The Auditor's offices will be open on November 6, 2012 from 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM to receive voted ballots, Election Day only. You may obtain a replacement ballot if the original ballot is destroyed, spoiled or lost; call (360) 875-9317 or (360) 642-9317. Replacement ballots may be requested in person or by phone at the Auditor's offices. Any ballots postmarked after the election **will not be counted**. Voting machines are also available at the South Bend and Long Beach Auditor's offices. The County Auditor's offices are ADA compliant and registration and voting aids are available upon request.
