OSD BOARD MEETING MINUTES

The meeting began at 7:04 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance. The following Directors were present: Dale McNitt, Pennie Lindsey, Gabe Kerr and Brad Armstrong. Staff present: Tara Holmes, Chris Petterson, Bob Davis, Shawn Coulter, Lori Buchman, Regine Peregoodoff, Rob Pottinger and Beth Fowler. Guests present: Deb Davis, Nick Porter, Ken Nielsen, Dottie Nielsen, Loren Cruden, Christina Brown, Herb Hippler, Roy Eslick, Linda Benzon, Nick Porter, Ray Dahl, Cheryl Merrill, Buzz Lakin, Christine Jenkins, Don McIrvin, Justin Hedrick, Kaleigh Hedrick, Roberta McIrvin, Bill McIrvin and Nate Dudley.

Additions/ Changes to the Agenda: None

Communication to the Board: Ken Nielsen referenced the last Board meeting communications and brought to attention Initiative 1351. He requested the Directors to reconsider running a levy. Kevin Wright shared concern of Directors duties and responsibilities. Roy Eslick shared concern that Gabe Kerr's residence is in Curlew and he should not be on the School Board for Orient. Cheryl Merrill requested wage cuts and encouraged Directors to investigate Colville's virtual school. Lori Buchman shared desire to support the school and her desire to be active with the Committee for Children. Herb Hippler requested that it be clear what the Levy will be used for and encouraged transparency.

ACTION ITEMS

Consent Agenda: Gabe motioned to approve the Consent Agenda consisting of November Board meeting minutes, November payroll in the total amount of \$56,886.72 (check #'s 15167 - 15182), November GF in the total amount of \$25,388.84 (check #'s 15183 - 15219), Transportation in the total amount of \$2,909.72 (check # 15220), CP in the total amount of \$4,544.94 (check # 15221), ASB in the total amount of \$60.02 and the financial report. Dale seconded; Motion carried 3 for 1 against.

It was decided that meetings need to be kept in control and future agendas will include a message stating, communications to the Board need to be in written form and turned into the school office by 3:00 p.m. the Thursday prior to monthly Board meeting. Communications will then be forwarded to the Board President to determine inclusion in Board meeting. Public members will be asked to present their communications in an orderly manner.

Maintenance and Operation Levy Resolution #1-14/15: Directors reviewed the resolution to request a Levy with the February ballot. The Foster Pepper firm assisted with correct and legal language in order to insure approval by the County Prosecutor. Pennie asked if the Directors heard the request from a community member to rescind the vote from the October meeting and table running a Levy now, allowing voters to decide if it is in the best interest of the school. Dale shared the importance of requesting a Levy now. It was discussed and agreed that an answer needed to be determined on how much is needed to run the school for a year. Gabe motioned to accept Resolution #1-14/15 as written. Dale seconded; Gabe voted yes, Brad voted yes, Dale voted yes, Pennie Voted no and Keith was absent for the voting. Motioned carried 3 for 1 against.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Winter Recess: It has been brought to the school's attention that some parents are concerned that children are going out for recess when the temperatures are cold. A letter was sent out to all school children families addressing the issue. Information was included provided by the National Department of Education as well as policy and practices of surrounding school districts. Follow up phone calls were made to determine if there is a need to develop new District Policy. It had been decided several years ago that at 10 degrees teachers would consider keeping children in for recess or limit time outdoors to ten or fifteen minutes. The general consensus from surveying is that teachers are entrusted with students all day and can determine safe recess practices. It was decided that a large thermometer would be purchased and installed on the front of the school or on the playground fence.

WSSDA: Pennie informed Directors that she will share information from The recently attended conference, at a future meeting.

Recording of Minutes: Information from WSDDA's, "Open Public Meetings" and "Robert's Rules" was reviewed. It was determined that Board agendas would be posted to the Orient School website and that the agenda would include a statement instructing that any communications to the Board need to be in written form, turned into the school office by 3:00 p.m. the Thursday prior to the monthly Board meeting in order to review and obtain answers to questions ahead of time. Individuals wishing to communicate to the Board would then be called to do so at the Board meeting.

Communications:

Business Manager: Shellie could not be present. She and Tara have been working on the PSE agreement to firm up longevity pay protocol. We have four new students enrolling in Orient Elementary to begin after the Holiday break.

Tara: Tara shared that the school has been busing with activities. Bobcat Boosters had a wreath making and selling fund raiser with the students which was very fun and successful. The Christmas program was wonderful and very well attended. Bobcat Boosters had a soup, bread and pie dinner prior to the performance. A special thank you to all who volunteered their time and talents this past busy month. There was another breach in the fire sprinkler system. It was caught very quickly with no water damage to the gym floor. We are currently working with the insurance company and Eric Dickson from ESD to take care of the issue. We will be interviewing for a new bus driver within the next two weeks.

Comments for the Good of the School: The 8th grade stocking raffle was again a success with students making the calls and gathering donations from businesses. There were many positive comments on what good things the school is doing and how respectful the students are.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:20 p.m.

RCW 28A.310.030

ESD board — Membership — Board member district boundaries.

Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, in each educational service district there shall be an educational service district board consisting of seven members elected by the school directors of the educational service district, one from each of seven educational service district board-member districts. Board-member districts in districts reorganized under RCW 28A.310.020, or as provided for in RCW 28A.310.120 and under this section, shall be initially determined by the state board of education. If a reorganization pursuant to RCW 28A.310.020 places the residence of a board member into another or newly created educational service district, such member shall serve on the board of the educational service district of residence and at the next election called by the superintendent of public instruction pursuant to RCW 28A.310.080 a new seven member board shall be elected. If the redrawing of board-member district boundaries pursuant to this chapter shall cause the resident board-member district of two or more board members to coincide, such board members shall continue to serve on the board and at the next election called by the superintendent of public instruction a new board shall be elected. The board-member districts shall be arranged so far as practicable on a basis of equal population, with consideration being given existing board members of existing educational service district boards. Each educational service district board member shall be elected by the school directors of each school district within the educational service district. Beginning in 1971 and every ten years thereafter, educational service district boards shall review and, if necessary, shall change the boundaries of board-member districts so as to provide so far as practicable equal representation according to population of such board-member districts and to conform to school district boundary changes: PROVIDED, That all board-member district boundaries, to the extent necessary to conform with this chapter, shall be immediately redrawn for the purposes of the next election called by the superintendent of public instruction following any reorganization pursuant to this chapter. Such district board, if failing to make the necessary changes prior to June 1st of the appropriate year, shall refer for settlement questions on board-member district boundaries to the office of the superintendent of public instruction, which, after a public hearing, shall decide such questions.

RCW 29A.04.151 Residence.

"Residence" for the purpose of registering and voting means a person's permanent address where he or she physically resides and maintains his or her abode. However, no person gains residence by reason of his or her presence or loses his or her residence by reason of his or her absence:

- (1) While employed in the civil or military service of the state or of the United States;
- (2) While engaged in the navigation of the waters of this state or the United States or the high seas;
- (3) While a student at any institution of learning;
- (4) While confined in any public prison.

Absence from the state on business shall not affect the question of residence of any person unless the right to vote has been claimed or exercised elsewhere.
